


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
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## Lesson 1: Self-Existence

### “I AM That I AM”

**Key Verse: Exodus 3:14**



#### Doctrinal Definition

God is eternally self-existent. He has no origin, no cause, and no dependency. He exists by His own nature, independent of all created things. His name “I AM” reveals His timeless, unchanging, and self-sufficient being.




## **Teacher's Notes**

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## Lesson 2: Immutability

### “I Change Not”

**Key Verse: Malachi 3:6**


### **Teacher’s Notes**
